Monument for Unknown Soldier of Karabagh is Dedicated in Michigan



St. Sarkis Church community, Dearborn, Michigan, recently dedicated this Khatchkar Monument to the memory of the Unknown Soldier of Karabagh. The Khatchkar was crafted in Armenia.

On Sunday, October 15, in the presence of several hundred tearful Armenians, a special ceremony was conducted in front of a newly erected Monument, dedicated to the Unknown Soldier of Karabagh, at St. Sarkis Church in Dearborn, Michigan. Presiding over the impressive ceremony was Archbishop Mesrob Ashjian with the participation of Archpriest Gorun Shrikian, deacons, and choir members.

During the Spring of 1992 Karabagh was under constant bombardment by Azerbaijan. Stepanagert, the capital, was turning into a ruin by the grad missiles stationed in the old fortress city of Shoushi, and the Armenian freedom fighting units of Karabagh were challenged on every front. Armenians, both in Armenia and the Diaspora, while enraged were unable to stop the barbaric actions of Azerbaijan.

At about the time that a few hundred Freedom Fighters were engaged in a critical assault against the fortified walls of Shoushi, the Eastern Prelacy was convening its National Representative Assembly in Dearborn.

Shoushi fell into Armenian hands on May 9, 1992. The clergy were assembled to start their conference the next day, when they received the news of the fall of Shoushi. The moment was over-

As we know, from that moment on the fighting history of Karabagh defenders changed. They became suddenly an organized army and started to occupy the adjoining territories that threatened their lines of communication and strategic position. The NRA of 1992 will

always be remembered because of the fall of Shoushi and especially because during the culmination banquet the Man of the Year was proclaimed to be "The Unknown Soldier of Karabagh."

On annoucing the "Man of the Year," His Eminence declared, "In view of the fact that during recent years the Armenian community of Detroit donated and sacrificed more than any other community in our diocese to the Karabagh cause, I would like to see on your community ground a Khatchkar erected in memory of the Unknown Soldier of Karabagh, whose bravery reestablished our national pride for the generations to come." Archbishop Ashjian's proposal was greeted with resounding applause.

The Khatckkar was crafted in Armenia by artist Vahram Hovagimian and shipped to the U.S. in late 1994. The construction of the monument site was postponed until the summer of 1995. The St. Sarkis Church Board of Trustees and the A.R.F. Azadamard Gomideh of Greater Detroit jointly participated in the concept, expense and the implementation of the project.

A committee of three persons, Rev. Dr. Gorun Shrikian, Ned Apigian, and Jack Garbooshian, was elected to study and recommend the site of the monument and find architects interested in participating in the project. The site was decided to be in front of St. Sarkis Church on the property line that is shared equally by the church and the Armenian Community Center. Two architects, Anita Mouradian and Ned Apigian, agreed to participate.

A second committee was elected to

committed daughter of the Armenian nation went to her eternal rest on Saturday, October 28 in New York Hospital.

Mrs. Hagopian became ill while vacationing in France during the summer and remained hospitalized in a coma in France and more recently in New York until her death. She and her late husband, Hovsep, were long time the U.S. supporters of the Armenian Church as well as educational and national institutions. The Wake took place at St. Sarkis Church, Douglaston, New York, on Tuesday, October 31. Funeral services took place on Wednesday, November 1, followed by burial at Cedar Grove Cemetery, Flushing, New York.

Archbishop Mesrob Ashjian described Mrs. Hagopian as a truly extraordinary woman. "It is difficult to speak of Suzanne Hagopian in the past tense," the Prelate said. "She has been a vibrant and active part of the Armenian American community for so many years and she has left her mark in so many varied ways that she will be with us forever. Her love for the Armenian Church was unmatched and her willingness to help with both her financial resources our community has certainly earned her an honored position in the Armenian Hall of Fame."

Archbishop Ashjian travelled to France to visit Mrs. Hagopian on September 21, where he prayed at her bedside and made arrangement in conjunction with Mrs. Hagopian's courtappointed guardian, Karekin Arzoo-

Suzanne Hagopian, a generous and manian, Esq., for her transfer to the United States. She was transferred to New York Hospital on September 29 and subsequently to a nursing facility. All efforts to bring her out of her coma were futile. Archbishop Ashjian expressed his deep thanks to Dr. Hrair Shahinian and Mr. Khoren Nalbandian both of whom were of tremendous help in arranging the transfer from France to

> Suzanne, or Shoushig as everyone affectionately called her, was born on December 25, 1914, to a traditional Armenian family in Adabazar, near Constantinople. She was the daughter of Takvor and Banzali Ajemian. Her maternal grandfather was Rev. Krikor Papazian and her maternal uncle was one of the great clergymen of the turnof-the-century, Bishop Sumpad Saadetian, who was martyred in 1915 in Erzeroum. It was Bishop Sumpad, she was proud to relate, that requested that she be named Shoushanig in honor of Vartan Mamigonian's daughter. It is no wonder that in recent years most of the publications Suzanne sponsored were dedicated to her beloved uncle, Bishop

Following the genocide of 1915 her and her active participation in the life of family relocated to Marseille, France, where the family established itself and centered its life around the church and community. In France she grew up with well-known community leader, Mr. Souren Fesjian, and the writer Henri Verneil. She was one of the youngest members of the Chorus of the Holy Translators Cathedral in Marseille.

moved to Paris where she was married to Hovsep Hagopian, forming a loving union which continued until Hovsep's death in 1983. In 1949 they moved to the United States and successfully continued their business which they began in France, Suzanne's Parisian Furs, which the couple maintained until their retirement. During this period she and her husband were ardent supporters of many Armenian institutions from the radio hour, Armenian Echoes, to St. Sarkis Church.

After Hovsep's death, her deep faith in God provided her with the inner courage to continue and to serve the community with even greater commitment. In everything she did she asked that the memory of her husband be honored and remembered, because, she said, she felt they were still together and still working as a team.

Without doubt, the institution that was closest to Shoushig's heart was the Armenian Church. She was a founding member of the Prelacy Ladies Guild, as well as its lifetime treasurer. Her world evolved around the Prelacy, St. Sarkis Church, and St. Sarkis's Hovsep and Suzanne Hagopian School. She and her husband were the benefactors which enabled the Prelacy to establish the St. Nerses Shnorhali Library which today is home to thousands of valuable volumes relevant to the history of the Armenian church and nation.

Archbishop Ashjian recalled her generous spirit and willingness to help. "Her deeds," His Eminence said, "can be seen everywhere, not just in the United States. She was a dedicated servant to the Great House of Cilicia and the Seminary. She displayed her strong leadership qualities following the fire which destroyed St. Sarkis Church in Bayside, and she went on to become one of the major donors for the construction of the new St. Sarkis Church in Douglaston.

For her outstanding service to the Armenian church she was made a Princess of Cilicia by His Holiness Karekin II in 1987. The Prelacy honored her as the Woman of the Year in 1985, the Hamazkain Armenian Educational and Cultural Association honored her in 1991. She accepted the honors modestly. She was always reluctant to speak about herself, steadfastly maintaining that "the future is important, not the past."

It is impossible to mention all of the institutions that have benefitted by Suzanne's commitment to Armenianism and her generous heart, but some that must be mentioned include:

supervise and implement the project-Rev. Shrikian, John Manoogian, Board Chairman, and Dr. Haig Oshagan, Azadamard Gomideh chairman. After several weeks of study, the architects presented their plans. Both plans were liked, but the design presented by Ned Apigian was accepted since he was also available to supervise the project.

The construction of the monument was mostly financed from funds accumulated during the past thirty years from the moneys collected from the April 24 Madagh donations. The community was planning to erect a monument for the Genocide of 1915. With the new monument into focus, it was decided to use those funds, since this monument implicitly is also dedicated to all the martyrs of the Armenian nation during the last century. On the four corners of the walls of the monument are the dates 1895, 1909, 1915, and 1988. The inscription on the monument itself reads: "Dedicated to the Unknown Soldier of Karabagh (Artsakh) whose valiant spirit, courage, dedication, and martyrdom re-established our national pride and prevented another genocide against the Armenian nation. 1988-1995." +

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V. R. Nareg Alemezian Elevated to Dzayrakouyn Vartabed

Very Rev. Nareg Alemezian, pastor of Sts. Vartanantz Armenian Apostolic Church in Ridgefield, New Jersey, was elevated to the rank of Dzayrakouyn Vartabed on Sunday, November 12, in the presence of parishioners and friends who filled the church beyond standing room capacity. The ordination service took place during the Divine Liturgy and was performed by the Prelate, His Eminence Archbishop Mesrob Ashjian. Very Rev. Khajag Hagopian, Rector of St. Illuminator Cathedral, served as sponsor and celebrant of the Divine Liturgy. The choir sang under the direction of Armen Babamian with organist Zovinar Menatzaganian-Vartanian.

The elevation was granted by His Holiness Aram I, Catholicos of the Great House of Cilicia, at the request of Archbishop Ashjian. The impressive ceremony was further enhanced and enjoyed because of a 16-page booklet which was prepared specially for this occasion explaining and translating the entire elevation ceremony.

The order of Vartabed with four ranks, is given to a celibate clergyman who successfully prepares and defends his dissertation. Subsequently, the rank of Dzayrakouyn Vartabed is bestowed upon a vartabed who has shown outstanding educational and leadership qualities. When the clergyman is elevated to Dzayrakouyn Vartabed, he is given an additional 10 ranks, which is considered to be the highest academic degree in the Armenian Church.

Following the religious ceremonies, the Board of Trustees hosted a luncheon in honor of Hayr Sourp in the Church's auditorium. This, too, was filled to capacity, with reservations having been sold out ten days prior to the event.
